Introductory Note

In 1897, after seventeen centuries of exile, the Jewish people, through an International Congress assembled at Basle, Switzerland, formulated its demand for a "publicly secured and legally assured homeland in Palestine." In 1917, only twenty years later, Great Britain indorsed the Jewish position and pledged, upon her strength and her prestige, the realization of the Basle Platform. Thus, this project, from its inception, by a people which, however prodigal of effort and sacrifice, nevertheless lacked the political and military power to effect its design, has developed into one of the war aims of the nation possessing the best equipment, political and military, to secure these terms of peace to which it is committed.

The Declaration to support the Jewish National enterprise followed the military penetration of Palestine during the successful campaign inaugurated by Great Britain in the late summer and the autumn of 1917. This pledge was published on behalf of the British Government by the Honorable Arthur J. Balfour, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, in his letter to Lord Rothschild, on November second of that year. Since that time, Great Britain has proceeded with the consummation of her purpose by effecting the complete military occupation of Palestine and by the installation of the Zionist Commission, which administers, under British protection, the affairs of Jewish Palestine.

The Zionist Organization of America, in order to ascertain the sentiment of the members of the Legislature towards the British Declaration particularly, and towards the Zionist movement in general, and to inform itself of what action, executive or legislative, the War-Congress would be inclined to recommend or approve, sent to each member of both Houses, on June 11, 1918, a copy of the following letter: "On November 2, 1917, the British Government, through the Honorable Arthur J. Balfour, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, officially declared its sympathy with Zionist aspirations, saying:

'His Majesty's Government view with favor the establishment in Palestine of a National Home for the Jewish people, and will use their best endeavours to facilitate the achievement of this object, it being clearly understood that nothing shall be done which may prejudice the civil and religious rights of non-Jewish communities in Palestine, or the rights and political status enjoyed by Jews in any other country.'

"This declaration was officially indorsed by the French Government on February 11, 1918, and again by the Italian Gov-

ernment on February 23, 1918.

"In view of President Wilson's utterances in favor of the rights of all similar nationalities, which are to be given the opportunity of determining their own futures, it is of the utmost interest to the Jewish people of the United States to be informed of the opinion of the members of the United States Senate and of the House of Representatives on this important question.

"We, therefore, take the liberty of addressing you at this

time with the following inquiries:

"1. Do you approve the official Declaration of England, France and Italy on the Zionist question, as quoted above?

- "2. Would you please let us have your reasons for favoring the Declaration? (If you do *not* favor it, please give us your reasons.)
- "3. Do you favor action by the United States Government in line with the British Declaration, now or within the near future?
- "4. Do you favor the adoption of an appropriate resolution by Congress in favor of the establishment in Palestine of a Jewish National Centre?
- "5. What are your views in general with regard to the effort of the Jewish people to establish a national home in Palestine?"

In addition to the letters received by the Zionist Organization from the members of the War Congress, this book contains the statements of the governments pledged to support the Jewish national aspirations.

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Besides Great Britain, Italy and France, the governments of Serbia, Holland, Greece, Siam, China and Japan have through official pronouncements committed themselves to the support of the project to establish a Jewish Homeland in Palestine. Whereas no action in line with the British Declaration has been taken by the Government of the United States, President Wilson in his letter to Rabbi Wise, on the thirty-first of August, 1918, expressed his sincere interest in the work of reconstruction in Palestine, and his satisfaction over the growth of the Zionist movement in the Allied countries and in the United States.

The fact that the statements of the members of Congress were received as early as June and as recently as December, 1918, will explain why some of them only have been written in the light of the President's letter.

The Balfour Declaration

Letter to Lord Rothschild from Mr. Arthur James Balfour, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs:

Foreign Office, Nov. 2nd, 1917.

Dear Lord Rothschild:

I have much pleasure in conveying to you on behalf of His Majesty's Government, the following declaration of sympathy with Jewish Zionist aspirations, which has been submitted to, and approved by, the Cabinet:

"His Majesty's Government view with favor the establishment in Palestine of a National Home for the Jewish people, and will use their best endeavours to facilitate the achievement of this object, it being clearly understood that nothing shall be done which may prejudice the civil and religious rights and political status enjoyed by Jews in any other country."

I should be grateful if you would bring this declaration to

the knowledge of the Zionist Federation.

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Letter of President Wilson to Rabbi Stephen S. Wise

The White House, Washington, 31 August, 1918.

My Dear Rabbi Wise:

I have watched with deep and sincere interest the reconstructive work which the Weizmann Commission has done in Palestine at the instance of the British Government, and I welcome an opportunity to express the satisfaction I have felt in the progress of the Zionist movement in the United States and in the Allied countries since the declaration by Mr. Balfour on behalf of the British Government, of Great Britain's approval of the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people, and his promise that the British Government would use its best endeavors to facilitate the achievement of that object, with the understanding that nothing would be done to prejudice the civil and religious rights of non-Jewish people in Palestine or the rights and political status enjoyed by Jews in other countries.

I think that all Americans will be deeply moved by the report that even in this time of stress the Weizmann Commission has been able to lay the foundation of the Hebrew University at Jerusalem, with the promise that that bears of spiritual

rebirth.

Government Indorsements

of Jewish National Aspirations and of the British Declaration

SERBIA

The following letter, of December 27, 1917, from Milenko Vesnitch, the head of the recent Serbian Mission to the United States, was sent to Capt. David Albala, a veteran of the Serbian Army, and forwarded by him to the Provisional Zionist Committee:

Serbian War Mission to the United States.

Dear Captain Albala:

I wish you to express to your Jewish brothers the sympathy of our Government and of our people for the just endeavor of resuscitating their beloved country in Palestine which will enable them to take their place in the future Society of Nations according to their numerous capacities and to their unquestioned right. We are sure that this will not only be to their own interest, but at the same time to that of the whole of humanity.

You know, dear Captain Albala, that there is no other nation in the world sympathizing with this plan more than Serbia. Do we not shed bitter tears on the rivers of Babylon in sight of our beloved land, lost only a short time ago? How should we not participate in your clamors and sorrows lasting ages and generations, especially when our countrymen of your origin and religion have fought for their Serbian fatherland as well as the best of our soldiers.

It will be a sad thing for us to see any of our Jewish fellow-citizens leaving us to return to their promised land, but we shall console ourselves in the hope that they will stand as brothers and leave with us a good part of their hearts and that they will be the strongest tie between free Israel and Serbia.

FRANCE

The French Government made the following official declaration in favor of a Jewish State in Palestine in accord with the Declaration to the same effect, made by the British Cabinet on November 2, 1917.

The Provisional Executive Committee for General Zionist Affairs has been authorized by M. Tardieu, the French High Commissioner to the United States, to make public the following communications bearing on this subject:

Message from Foreign Minister Pichon to M. Tardieu:

Feb. 12, 1918.

Having seen M. Sokolow (representative of the Zionist Organizations), I authorized him to state that, as regards the question, our views were essentially the same as the views entertained by the British Government.

(Naval Radio, from the Press Bureau of The Ministry of Foreign Affairs)

M. Sokolow was received today by M. Stephen Pichon. M. Pichon was happy to reaffirm that the understanding is complete between the French and the British Governments, concerning the question of the Jewish establishment in Palestine.

ITALY

Through its Ambassador at the Court of St. James, the Italian Government, on Feb. 25, 1918, officially signified its approval of the English and French Declarations in favor of the Zionist movement and of a Jewish National Homeland in Palestine. Mr. Nahum Sokolow, representative in London of the Zionist International Political Committee, received from Ambassador Imperiali, the following formal statement of Italy's attitude of these questions:

"On the instructions of His Excellency, Baron Sonnino, His Majesty's Minister for Foreign Affairs, I have the honour to inform you that H. M. Government is pleased to confirm the declarations already made through their representatives in Washington, the Hague and Salonica, to the effect that they will use their best endeavours to facilitate the establishment in

Palestine of a Jewish National Centre, it being understood that this shall not prejudice the legal or political status enjoyed by Jews in any other country."

GREECE

On March 14th, 1918, M. Politis, the Greek Minister for Foreign Affairs, stated in the Chamber of Deputies:

"I have already had occasion in Salonika to express the very sincere sympathy of the Liberal party and of all Hellenes for the Jewish Nation, for twenty centuries the victim of misunderstandings and persecutions. I am glad to renew today the promise which I then gave that at the right moment the Liberal Government will put forth every effort to assist the national task of the Jews in full accord with the great Allies of Greece. Apart from the motives of sympathy which we have had for the Jewish race, a new bond is now added. Among other points in common, the Jewish race and the Greek race have that of both belonging with those races which have ceased to be subjected to persecution. At this moment when Hellenism has been literally led to exhaustion by the barbarians of the East, I address with emotion to the Jewish race all my wishes for their establishment as a nation."

HOLLAND

Mr. Jacobus Kann, President of the Dutch Zionist Federation, was authorized by the Dutch Government to declare that it is sympathetic toward Zionist aspirations.

SIAM

The Zionist Organization of America received the text of a statement issued by the Siamese Government expressing its approval of the plan to establish in Palestine a National Homeland for the Jewish people. The statement was issued to Mr. E. S. Kadoorie, one of the leading bankers of China and President of the Shanghai Zionist Association, by H. R. H. Prince Devawongse Varopakar, Siamese Minister for Foreign Affairs. It reads as follows:

Foreign Office, Bangkok, August 22, 1918.

Dear Sir:

I have the honour to state that the Royal Siamese Government expresses its accord with the sympathetic position taken by its Allies with reference to the establishment of Palestine as a National Home for the Jewish people and, in co-operation with the Allied Powers, will use its best endeavours to facilitate the achievement of this object, it being clearly understood that nothing will be done that may prejudice the civil or religious rights of existing non-Jewish communities in Palestine.

CHINA

The Zionist Organization of America received a cablegram from Mr. E. S. Kadoorie, President, and N. E. B. Ezra, Secretary of the Shanghai Zionist Association, informing it that on Dec. 14, 1918, the Chinese Government had officially endorsed the project for establishing a Jewish Homeland in Palestine. The text of the Chinese endorsement is as follows:

The Chinese Government expresses its complete accord with Great Britain's proposals for the restoration of Palestine as the National Home of the Jewish people, it being clearly understood that nothing shall be done which may prejudice the civil and religious rights of existing non-Jewish communities in Palestine or the rights and political status enjoyed by Jews in any other country, and will co-operate with her Allies at the Peace Conference in the attaining of that object.

JAPAN

The government of Japan authorized its Ambassador to Great Britain to announce its approval of the project to establish in Palestine a Jewish National Homeland in accordance with the principles enunciated in the Balfour Declaration of November 2, 1917.

By Senator Charles S. Thomas, Of Colorado.

Acquisition of Homeland Dignifies Position.

"Having given the subject some consideration since the capture of Jerusalem by the British forces, I do not hesitate to give it my unqualified endorsement. I believe, that the status of the Jewish people the world over would be improved and their rights more fully recognized, if, like people of other races, they enjoyed a fixed national territory, possessing the attributes of a modern government, and recognized as a member of the family The representation which this condition of nations. would give through the interchange of envoys and ministers to other countries, and the consciousness of the collective citizenship of the race, endowed with the attributes of a nation could not be otherwise than beneficial and elevating to the humblest member of the race. Such a movement would do for the Jews what the rehabilitation of Greece has accomplished for the Greeks within the short space of a century.

Independence of Palestine Indispensable to Peace.

"Politically, the conversion of Palestine into an independent nation, in view of the boundless and unscrupulous ambitions of Germany, would seem to be an indispensable element in assuring future peace to the world. This obvious situation doubtless inspired the announcement of the British Government, November 2nd, last, albeit, the sentimental side of the proposal may have been quite as persuasive. A compact, powerful and self-governing people in Asia Minor, thrust between the German-controlled Turkish dominions to the North and the Suez Canal, with Arabia to the South would do much to check the tide of aggression from that quarter and safeguard the great sea route through the Suez Canal to India.

Among War's Crowning Benefits. "Aside from these considerations is the one which presumably appeals to the Jews more powerfully than all of them. I refer to that national longing which the race has entertained ever since its dispersion by the Romans, which has survived persecution, adversity, and all of the misery of centuries. The re-establishment of a Jewish Nation upon the site of its former home will

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satisfy that aspiration and constitute a monument of justice-albeit a tardy one-to the heroic and indomitable persistence of Judaism throughout the centuries. This, of itself, will, I think, guarantee the success of the enterprise, to which posterity will point as one of the crowning benefits of the world's greatest war.

"Although the foregoing statement would seem to Zionism constitute a collective reply to your several queries, I Encouraged. will nevertheless also make these categorical answers:

"I approve the Declaration of our Allies upon the

Zionist question, for the reasons above outlined.

"I think that our own Government should officially express its accord with these declarations through an appropriate joint resolution by Congress to that effect.

"I think the effort of the Jewish people to establish a national home in Palestine should be encouraged at

all times."

The speech of Senator France, delivered on February 18, 1917, follows:

"A JEWISH RE-DEDICATION.

Preservation of Jewish Ideals.

"Through all the centuries from the dawn of civilization the Hebrew people have lived on; they have witnessed the birth, the rise and the fall of many empires, and the extinction of many races of men; they have lived on, preserved by a special providence and through all the years of their remarkable history, priceless gifts, matchless contributions and new spiritual revelations have been made, by them, and through them, to humanity; and to the civilization of the world its indispensable gifts.

"It is possible to imagine this world without the contributions which some nations have made to history, but I cannot conceive of this world as it would have been without Palestine, and without that great spiritual light with which the whole world has been illumined; a light which has come through the genius and mission of the

Hebrew people.

World's Heritage from Ancient State. "I cannot conceive of a world without the sacred books with their inspiring national and spiritual history. I cannot imagine a world without the law and the great words of the Hebrew prophets, which have come ringing with authority down through all the centuries as true and as potent today as they were when spoken. What would the world be without the Psalms, sung first in Palestine and then in ever-widening circles with the passage of the centuries, by an ever-swelling chorus joined now by men of every land and tribe, a chorus which shall yet rise higher, ascending as a mighty paean of praise when all the peoples of the earth shall unite to sing the infinite Fatherhood of God and the unlimited brotherhood of man.

Cultural Revival. "I do not feel that I am competent to discuss all of the phases of the Zionist question. Some hold, I know, that this great Zionist movement must lose some of its significance with the inevitable decline of the anti-Semitic sentiments and feelings; other contend that the great works of the Jews for the world must be done within the countries of which they are now such an important and integral part. I have no doubt myself that anti-Semitic feelings and sentiments must decline and ultimately disappear completely with the progress of civilization. I am convinced also that it would be an irreparable loss to the world to have any large proportion of your people leave their present homes, in the enlightened countries, to take up residences in Palestine, and vet I do believe the Zionist movement to be something far more significant than a mere effort to establish a refuge in Palestine for the oppressed Jews of Russia and of Southern Europe, desirable and important as such a movement as that, in itself, would be. I believe that its most thoughtful advocates see in this movement not only the securing of a national home, the reclamation of Palestine, the awakening of an interest in the revival of Jewish agriculture, language, literature and art, but, more than all, the rededication of the Jewish people themselves to the great spiritual conceptions and ideals of the past, to that lofty spiritual altruism which is the very essence of their religion.

"We all stand in danger, particularly in this country, Spiritual with our great prosperity, of sinking into materialism. Every man wants to play a man's part, to heroically meet and overcome the problems and difficulties of daily life, and he naturally desires those material things which are not only enjoyable in themselves, but which are also the outward symbols of success and victory. Our greatest menace today is that materialism and paganism, which have ever been in the past so destructive to national life. We must keep our spiritual eyes open, remembering ever that 'where there is no vision the people perish.' Spiritual vision is more important than material possession.

"Our great Republic needs the very best that is in Quickening every Jewish citizen; his patriotism, his great practical ability, his spiritual insight and this most significant America. Zionist movement, which cannot succeed without a renewed devotion on your part to your best traditions and

"My special reason for desiring to see the Jewish people restored to nationhood in their own homeland of Palestine, is that the world owes Jewish people a debt of gratitude. They have laid the corner stone of our civilization in the Ten Commandments, in the ethics of the Hebrew prophets, in the wise legislation of Moses, the greatest of law givers, and in planting the ideals by which the world has tried to live. During these stirring times I cannot help thinking of Isaiah and the lofty ideals

of peace on earth that he preached. Then too, when we turn to the fields of art, of science and of literature, we find Jews making some of the most important contributions.

"Our own beloved country owes much to the Jewish America's people from its earliest history to this day. With the Jews. men who accompanied Columbus to these shores, there were Jews. In all the early struggles of the colonies Jews did their part. In the Revolutionary War there were Jewish fighters. Jewish financiers helped finance the War without asking for the return of the moneys which they loaned to the Government. In the Civil War Iews did veoman service in the ranks as well as in important offices. And if we turn to our own time, we find the Jewish people giving their share, and more, of the men who fight under the Stars and Stripes. As I scan the casualty lists from day to day, I find the names of Jewish boys who have given their lives, or who have been broken in body, that the United States may succeed in this War. Financially, whether the Government solicits loans, whether the Red Cross asks for contributions. or whether it be the Y. M. C. A., the Knights of Columbus, etc., who ask for money to do War work, the Jewish people are among the first to respond and do always more than their share. For these and many more reasons I hope soon to see the day when the Jewish people will again till the soil of their ancestral home so that they may again proclaim to the world the ideals which are so sorely needed by harassed mankind."

"That the Jews should have a land in which they can live fully and freely, without the repressions they have suffered at the hands of almost every nation in the old world with whom they have sought a home is a matter not of philanthropy but of justice. And it is to be expected that after the war we shall witness the abolition of these unfair restrictions and the establishment of the right of Jews to practice their religion freely, to engage in business and to receive an education, to be citizens and voters, and to enjoy all the fundamental rights of human beings living in a highly organized society.

Turkish Oppression Ended. "These rights can and must be guaranteed to the Jews in Palestine. Toleration of national injustice is no longer good form. The heavy tribute which the Turks have always exacted from the Jews, in return for which the Jews were allowed to establish very limited educational and industrial enterprises that were in constant jeopardy of destruction and oppression is a thing of the past. The great nations of the world that are fighting for democracy and justice have recognized this, and assistance in securing justice to the Jews has been pledged.

"The great labor organizations in America, in France, in Great Britain, have all urged the establishment of Palestine as a free and democratic nation in which the Jews may develop their own cultural and economic institutions. And Mr. Arthur Henderson, Labor Member of the House of Commons of Great Britain, was not speaking for himself alone when he said last December: "The British Labour movement has included among its war aims a demand that the Jews of all countries, great and small, shall enjoy the elementary rights of tolerance, freedom of residence and travel, and equal

citizenship that ought to be extended to all inhabitants Labor of every nation; and it has so declared its belief that it Declaration. would be practicable by agreement among all the nations to set Palestine free from the harsh and oppressive government of the Turk, in order that the country may form a Free State, under international guarantee, where the Jewish people may work out their own salvation free from interference by those of alien race and religion.

"If these rights can be guaranteed to the Jews in Palestine, then those Jews who desire to go back to the of Jews in land of their fathers to live a free, unrestricted Jewish Palestine. life, to speak Hebrew, to develop their own educational and economic systems, their own literature, their own industrial and cultural institutions, should be allowed to do so. And those Jews in every country in the world, who do not care to go back to Palestine, should nevertheless enjoy the consciousness that in Palestine they have a centre of Jewish culture upon which they may rely for the development of the Jewish race.

"By its geographical position, Palestine stands as a gateway between the eastern and western worlds. It is, therefore, peculiarly susceptible to commercial exploita-

tion by the more powerful nations.

"But Palestine must not be a project for financial exploitation. Like the other small nations for whose rights we are fighting, Palestine must stand free and independent, respected by the nations of the world for the intelligence and earnestness of its endeavor and for the contributions it will make to the development of world civilization.

"The time is at hand to congratulate the Jews upon the imminent realization of their dream of centuries, and to help them to re-establish themselves in their old home, to the end that economic and cultural benefits may redound to themselves and to the world."

ber 2, 1918, namely:

1896, to wit:

"The establishment of a publicly recognized, legally secured homeland for the Jewish people in Pales-

tine.

Zionist Dream Realized.

"Yes.-No longer is the 'publicly recognized and legally secured home for the Jewish people in Palestine' a mere dream or fantasy. The declaration of Great Britain, as we all know, has been received with equal favor by Italy, France, and all Allied democratic Nations. A Jewish National home, no longer a dream, is a reality; no longer a fantasy, is an international fact. Founders and adherents to the Congress at Basle, well

may you be proud of your accomplishments.

"The Zionist movement has many ardent advocates and able supporters among Jews and Gentiles throughout the earth. The great world struggle has given a powerful impetus to this movement. Besides, the national idea and the religious self-consciousness of the Hebrew race in all ages have been seeds awaiting ripening for such an event. It has been truly said that 'since the destruction of the second temple by Titus, since the dispersion of the Jews throughout the world, this ancient people has not ceased to long fervently for a return to the lost land of their fathers nor to entertain for it a determined hope.'

Overcoming Possible Obstacles. "The obstacles to this new plan of erecting an independent Jewish State in Palestine are many, but not insuperable. The British Government and her allies propose to guarantee to the Jews the return of the territory of their ancient Jewish fatherland. The two great essential elements of such an enterprise are in existence—a country without a people and a people without a country.

Tide of Immigration already Flowing towards Palestine.

"Palestine is about the size of the State of Vermont, and has a present population of about 600,000 souls. There are about 14,000,000 Jews in the world. If half this number were to return to the ancient home of their race, the country could not well maintain them, but the present Zionist movement does not contemplate such an exodus of Jews from their present homes. According to a conservative estimate, the territory of Palestine could easily maintain a population of four and one-half millions of people. A successful culmination of this movement would probably realize an emigration of that number from other lands, as the innate love of the average Jew for the cradle land of his race, coupled with glorious and thrilling memories of long ago, and the hard lot of misery and grinding toil now endured by many of them in different parts of the world, would be a powerful incentive to join the new settlements in the East. The tide of emigration is already beginning to flow that way.

"There is no reason from a physical viewpoint why Popular Jerusalem and the surrounding country should not beof Land's come the seat of a prosperous and successful Jewish Intertility The popular notion that Palestine is a barren Erroneous. country, not capable of yielding rich harvests, is a mistaken one. Its appearance is barren only during the dry season, when the grasses which cover the greater part of it are dried up, and the herdsmen retire with their flocks of sheep and goats to the loftier mountains. The alluvial lowland to the sound of Mount Carmel is as fruitful as ever, and it only needs an honest and vigorous administration to restore Palestine to its former fruitful condition.

Such a commonwealth, kingdom or republic, is a consummation most devoutly to be wished, if Jewish genius and civilization are not to be lost, as is now feared, in the maelstrom of war and in the readjustment of the boundaries of States and the realignment of races.

"Why should not the nations of the earth join in such Let Nations an enterprise, if the Jews desire it? Every kingdom of the earth has tried its hand at exterminating them and has failed. Why should they not now change the program for awhile and extend to the patriarch of the tribes, the old man of the centuries, a kindly and helping hand? England will turn Palestine over to the Jewish people.

"I speak of this principle as bearing on the relation of the subject under discussion, to the duty of patriotism. the most pressing duty of the hour. The Jew, upon freely adopting America, must be true to America. As soon as he is endowed with all the rights of American citizenship, he must be true to himself as an American citizen. He owes America what every other American owes it; a single-hearted and all absorbing devotion. His spirt must be purely American. He must draw upon and contribute to the American genius—a genius which, however lavishly it may draw from the ancient genius of the Jewish people, is, nevertheless, no other genius but its

The same is true, of course, of the Englishman, the Frenchman, the Italian or the member of any other nationality, who of his own free will and accord adopts America as his home. There is only this difference as regards outward circumstances. The Frenchman who does not adopt America, can still be true to himself, by being true to France. Likewise, largely as to the other nationalities. The Jew, who desires to remain a Jew, however, is denied this privilege, and is therefore unable to exercise his highest duty. His home denied to him, he perforce adopts this or that country, and the very element of compulsion in this adoption negatives the existence of the equality of rights, with its inevitable corollary, the equality of duties.

"The unescapable logic of the foregoing is that the Jew, who has not spontaneously adopted this or any other country, as his home—to whom Palestine alone is domicile and home-land, ought to be afforded ample opportunity to give expression to his highest self by becoming a citizen of Palestine. That large or small remnant of Jews, as the case may be, constituting in a comparative sense the Jewish people, should no longer be denied the very thing that is most worth while in

human life.

So, he said, has been the Jewish Race. It has flowed through all lands and lived under all Governments, but has never been dissipated nor lost, throughout its centuries of wandering.

Entire Sympathy With Declarations. "I am in entire sympathy with the declaration contained in the letter of Mr. A. J. Balfour, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, dated November 2, 1917, and addressed to Lord Rothschild. That letter states that the British Declaration of sympathy with Zionistic aspirations had been submitted and approved by the English Cabinet. Further declarations to the same end have also been put forth by France and Italy.

Indorses Basle Program. "I am in favor of establishing in Palestine that kind of a home which is contemplated by the organic law of the Zionist movement as formulated in the Basel program of August, 1897. This program was adopted by the first Congress of Jews which met at Basel in Switzerland under the leadership of the great Dr. Theodore Herzl. Its basic declaration was that the object of Zionism is the creation for the Jewish people of a home in Palestine, secured by public international law. This is to say, there can not be established in Palestine any great home for the Jewish people which shall not be approved by civilized public opinion, as embodied in the organic law of the world. These great ideas are given further exposition by the eminent Mr. Justice Louis Brandeis in the following language:

"'Zionism seeks to establish in Palestine, for such Jews as choose to go and remain there, and for their descendants, a legally secured home, where they may live together and lead a Jewish life, where they may expect ultimately to constitute a majority of the population, and may look forward to what we should call home rule.'

"In view of these facts, I can not see how anybody, Jewish or non-Jewish, can be opposed to Zionist aspirations. It seems to me that any Jew who is a Zionist must be not alone a better Jew for that fact, but also a better American, because by supporting the Zionistic ideal he is supporting the liberty of his own great and distinguished race in the world, while at the same time not in the slightest impairing the loyalty which he owes first and above all to America. Intelligent non-Jews

can certainly find nothing in the Zionist platform which is not in thorough accord with the democratic traditions of America and the principles of peace as they have been

enunciated by President Wilson.

"It is the hope of America that in Abraham Lincoln's phrase 'all men everywhere may be free'; and that all Jewish peoples, whether great or small, shall have the right to work out their own destinies unhampered by tyranny. The Jewish people have suffered perhaps more than any other people from persecution of various kinds. It is only an act of justice that not alone shall full civil and religious rights be granted to them in all lands, but that they shall have the right to establish in their ancient home a land of their own where such pioneering spirits among them as may desire to do so shall be free to set up characteristic Jewish institutions and to build up a characteristic Jewish life and culture.

"There is no compulsion in the Zionistic movement, as I understand it, that any man in any land shall return to Zion. It does not contemplate a removal of all the Jews of the world to Palestine, because Palestine at most could not accommodate more than one-fifth of the four-

teen million Jews that there are in the world.

"To my mind the establishment of a national home for the Jewish people seems practicable, when we consider that in twenty years between the Basel program of August, 1897, and the declaration of the British Government of November, 1917, the Jewish people have established over forty colonies in the Holy Land, have revivified the Hebrew language, have organized the Zionistic movement in all civilized lands, and have already given to the world through this movement such great leaders as Herzl, Aaronsohn, the discoverer of wild wheat, Weizmann, the head of the English Zionists, and have been able to arouse the sympathy and labors of such men as Max Nordau, Sokolow, Lord Rothschild, Justice Brandeis, and innumerable other great men.

"There are a number of Jewish people in my constituency, and from my personal contact with them I Jews and know that the Zionistic movement has been a splendidly non-Jews.

I think the future holds for all of us better conditions, nobler opportunities for service for each other, and I believe in this new period of the world, upon which we are about to enter, that the people of the world will work out their own destinies without any government interfering therewith, and among these peoples will be the Jews. Just what that destiny is I am unable to say, but I think they should be permitted to work it out in their own way unhindered and unimpeded."
